

# Porini Rhino Camp

## OL PEJETA CONSERVANCY



Porini Rhino Camp is located in Ol Pejeta Conservancy a 90,000 acre wildlife conservancy situated between the foot hills of the Aberdares and the magnificent snowcapped Mount Kenya. Ol Pejeta Conservancy boasts an astounding variety of animals including all the "Big Five" (the endangered black rhino, leopard, elephant, buffalo and lion) as well a sanctuary for rescued chimpanzees and also incorporates the smaller Sweetwaters Game Reserve. The combination of amazing wildlife and stunning views across the open plains of Ol Pejeta guarantees an unforgettable safari experience.

### LOCATION

Ol Pejeta Conservancy has a large area of over 60,000 acres reserved exclusively for 4x4 safari vehicles and small exclusive eco-camps and this is where our Porini Rhino Camp is located. There is an airstrip about 10 minutes from Camp for private charters or the Nanyuki airstrip used by the scheduled services is a 45-minute drive from the Conservancy.

### THE CAMP

Porini Rhino Camp is hidden in a secluded valley and set amongst shady acacia trees on the banks of a seasonal river. The camp consists of 6 spacious guest tents, each comfortably furnished with en suite bathrooms,

flush toilets and safari showers. The camp is very environmentally-friendly with solar powered lighting and no generator. Each tent has been sited to have beautiful views of the surrounding area.

### THE EXPERIENCE

The combination of amazing wildlife and stunning views across the open plains of Ol Pejeta guarantees an unforgettable safari experience. Game drives are taken in the camp's 4x4 safari vehicles with qualified safari guides. Guided walks are taken on the open plains escorted by Maasai warriors. Night drives are also taken to see the nocturnal animals. All the Big Five have been seen on game drives from the camp.



## DAILY PROGRAMME

During your stay, clients will normally have a programme as follows, but of course we're flexible and there to cater to what you'd like

### DAY 1

Fly from Wilson Airport in Nairobi to Nanyuki, arriving at 1240. You will be met at the airstrip and transferred to Porini Rhino Camp, located in the Ol Pejeta Conservancy. Lunch and afternoon tea in camp and then head off to look for rhino with your driver-guide in the camp's 4x4 safari vehicle. Return to Porini Rhino Camp for dinner and overnight.

### DAY 2

Full day in Ol Pejeta with game drives and walking activities from camp and a night game drive after dinner.  
Overnight Porini Rhino Camp.

### DAY 3

Early morning bush walk or game drive, breakfast and then depart Porini Rhino Camp and transfer to Nanyuki for the flight back to Nairobi or on to the Mara

## FACILITIES AND ACTIVITIES AVAILABLE

- Large Safari tents with a double and single bed, solar electric lights, en suite bathrooms with flush toilets and safari shower.
- All meals and picnic lunches, free mineral water, sodas, gin & tonic, beer and house wine.
- Custom built 4x4 safari vehicles for game drives.
- Expert driver-guides. Morning, evening and night game drives in Ol Pejeta Conservancy.
- Escorted walk with Maasai guides.
- Sundowner drinks to watch the sunset from scenic viewing points.
- Transfers from Nanyuki airstrip to Porini Rhino Camp.

## CONSERVATION

In 2004 the Ol Pejeta Reserve was purchased by Fauna and Flora International, a UK based conservation organization. The Sweetwaters game reserve has now be extended to encompass the entire ranching area to form the "Ol Pejeta Conservancy", approximately 90,000 acres in size. This has created the largest sanctuary in East Africa for the endangered Black Rhino. The aim of the Conservancy is to generate profits from wildlife tourism for reinvesting into community development in the local area. Porini Camp was selected as one of the Camps to help in accomplishing these goals.

Our Porini Camps are run and maintained with the conservation of the environment at the forefront. We have a written environmental policy in regards to water, land, energy, solid waste and sewage which is adhered to by the camp management. The numbers of tourist visitors are being limited to retain the wild and unspoilt nature of the area and to minimise the impact on the environment.



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
